2019-20 SWIFT FOX PELT TAGGING REPORT

PERFORMANCE REPORT STATEWIDE WILDLIFE RESEARCH AND SURVEYS

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The swift fox (*Vulpes velox*) is classified as a furbearer in Kansas (K.S.A. 32-701 (e)). There has been a harvest season for swift fox in Kansas since 1982. Since that time, harvest information has been acquired by the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism (KDWPT) through an annual Furbearer Harvest Survey. Additionally, a pelt tagging program was initiated in 1994 to acquire more precise information on swift fox distribution and harvest.




Figure 1. Number of swift foxes pelt tagged annually by KDWPT since a tagging program was initiated in 1994.

Any swift fox taken in Kansas must be presented to KDWPT for tagging within seven days of the close of the season (K.A.R. 115-5-2). All five KDWPT regional and district offices as well as biologists and conservation officers within or near the swift fox range are provided with tags. The number of swift foxes presented annually to KDWPT for pelt tagging since the tagging program was initiated is presented in **Figure 1**. In 2019-20, 149 swift foxes were taken by furharvesters in Kansas.

Swift foxes may be taken using equipment authorized in K.A.R. 115-5-1. **Table 1** provides a breakdown of the methods used to take swift foxes and the primary species being pursued at the time the swift fox was taken. Trapping accounted for over 94% of the harvest, but just under a third (32.2%) were taken by individuals whose primary target was swift fox. This is the first time in the last six years that over 30% of swift fox were taken as the primary target species. In the 10 years prior to that, almost 70% on average were taken as a primary target. This season, 51.7% were taken by trappers primarily targeting coyotes, plus an additional 7.4% reported targeting coyote and swift fox or unspecified "canine". Over the past several years, it seems the strong coyote pelt market has driven swift fox harvest.

Thirty-six furharvesters took swift foxes during the season, up from 15 last season. Annual season bag per furharvester is provided in **Table 2**.

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


Figure 2. Estimated number of swift foxes taken per day during the 2019-20 furharvesting season (n=143).

Swift fox season opened on November 13, 2019 and ended February 15, 2020. Daily harvest is provided in **Figure 2**. Harvest by month is as follows: November – 25, December – 79, January – 32, February – 27 (n=143).




Figure 3. Kansas counties from which swift foxes have been harvested since 2013, and the most recent season of harvest (2019 = 2019-20 harvest season).

Swift foxes were harvested from 16 western Kansas counties in 2019-20. This included an unexpected harvest from Lincoln County by a predator caller who reported that the swift fox he shot was accompanied by another one. Counties from which swift foxes have been harvested since 2013 and the most recent year of harvest is provided in **Figure 3**.
